Tribunal of Inquiry.

I went to the Chemical Society lecture, together with approx. 200 other students, in order to register a protest ^{against} and ask questions about chemical and biological warfare. I was at the back of the committee room and kneeling and consequently I was unable to see a great deal (contrary to evidence given by Mr Wyatt in which he claimed I said I had seen everything). Nevertheless, I have some fairly useful evidence to offer.

About half-way during the reading of the Statement there was a slight commotion at the front. I stood up and witnessed several members of the Chemistry Dept. hustling Dr Inch out of the room. The doorway was blocked due to the large numbers present and hence there was a minor scuffle and shouting.

By the time I had got into the corridor there were a considerable number of people jammed into the corner outside the restaurant. The gathering was calm, there were only intermittent bouts of shouting and quite a reasonable dialogue was going on between Dr Inch and students. Then, a certain amount of jostling broke out and policemen were visible above the heads of students. Several members of the Chemistry Dept. (one of them Dr. Tillet, I believe) emerged from a side staircase and began to pull aside students at the rear of the group around Dr Inch and thus creating further disorder. A breach was then made in the crowd and policemen ushered Dr Inch down a side staircase followed by students.

I did not witness any of the alleged disturbances with police outside Wivenhoe House as I was explaining to Mr Wyatt and Mr Killey that the arrival

of police had precipitated disorder in an otherwise calm situation. However, about 5 minutes after the police had departed I was standing in a group (including Anna Mendelson, Mike Gonzales, Phil Strong and Tim Clark) towards the valley end of Wivenhoe House when someone yelled 'look out!' and I was pulled aside as a grey VIVA, registration no. FUV 104C drove at us. The car was accelerating and travelling at approx. 25 m.p.h., it made no attempt to avoid us and in fact deliberately swerved towards us as we were then in the middle of the road. The driver was in his late 20s had fairish hair and wore glasses with very thick lenses; there was another man in the passenger seat (dark colouring) who turned round and grinned as the car proceeded towards the valley. I sign this as a correct account of what I actually witnessed.
