

GOODCHILD GIVING EVIDENCE

- you saw
- Q. I gather/the police car in Square 5, which you took a photograph of.
- A. Yes that's right.
- Q. Can you estimate what sort of time this would be.
- A. I can only say it was around 4.30, possibly after 4.30. The reason I say this is because I then went straight to Wivenhoe House after I had taken the picture and the meeting had moved from the conference room. I believe the meeting was scheduled to start at 4.30, so unless it started early, in fact, it was after 4.30. I was talking to <sup>Shaun Leslie</sup> ~~Sean Wesley~~ at the time, perhaps he may know the time it was.
- Q. Did you see that car drive from Square 5 up to Wivenhoe House.
- A. Yes. I cut across the fields as the car went up to the car park.
- Q. They didn't take the short road.
- A. No. It went up the footpath again through the car park and then took the road from the car park to Wivenhoe House.
- Q. Did you notice if it was the first car to arrive at the house.
- A. Yes. I believe it was. I didn't notice any other police cars, I just noticed this being the first one.
- Q. Were the policemen, connected with the car in Square 5, doing anything.
- A. In Square 5?
- Q. Yes.



- A. Well they got out of the car and went into the porters desk. They came out from the porters desk in a hurry and got into the car and drove up to Wivenhoe House.
- Q. Did you see them arrive in Square 5.
- A. I saw the car come into Square 5 but this was from the other<sup>side</sup> of Square 4.
- Q. Did they only stay in Square five a few minutes.
- A. Time for me to get down from the first floor to the ground floor, run across the square and take four pictures.
- Q. And when you got to Wivenhoe House, you say Dr. Inch was just beginning to answer questions.
- A. Yes. Just as I got in there I asked who he was. I heard him say words to the effect that "I am ~~am~~ answering questions".
- Q. Did you hear the reading of the indictment?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Before that?
- A. No, after that.
- Q. Can you estimate how long it took you from Square 5 up to the House.
- A. Two minutes. Possibly even less. I ran.
- Q. There was quite a long period, we know, in the lobby when there was comparative silence and the indictment was read out. You heard that did you.
- A. Yes.



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Q. Turning now to get our timing straight. Could you describe very briefly the course of proceedings as you saw them in the lobby after you arrived.

A. I heard Dr. Inch say I'll answer your questions. I stood there and asked John Bull a question and I heard some comments and the indictment being read out. Then somebody said that police were arriving so I then went out of the house again and I took a picture of the police car coming into Wivenhoe House. Then I went down to the car park and I took three or four pictures of the police cars as they arrived, one with the dogs. I took some pictures of the chemistry staff. I just stood around waiting for the police to do something and they went inside. I think I took another picture or so and then I followed the police inside and a porter tried to stop me but I showed him my card and went on in.

Q. The photograph that you took of the dog outside the van. Was this before the police went in.

A. No this was after the meeting had broken up. I went inside and Dr. Inch by this time was being moved towards the direction of the restaurant. In fact he was just in the door.



Q. Did you hear Dr. Inch answering any questions.

A. Yes. I don't know exactly what they were because I was right at the back and couldn't hear very well. I heard people reading things and questioning him. As he got towards the door there was a policeman who seemingly turned on someone, either pushed or something, and people started chanting his number. Then was then a general sort of surging to the door and then the mustard was thrown. After that I went back out again into the car park trying to see Dr. Inch being taken off in the police car.

Q. Did you run up to Wivenhoe House.

A. Yes.

Q. We heard that some of the police, the first arrival, came to the end of the corridor and waited for quite a long time before they moved in. Did you get to the end of the corridor before any policemen arrived.

A. Arrived actually in the house?

Q. Yes.

A. No, the first substantial period between the first police car arriving and the police actually moving in ..... There was a sequence of events. As I say, as the police car arrived I went into the house just after it pulled up in the car park. I was there for three or four minutes then I went outside.

Q. When you were there, or even before you got there, did any police come along and stand at the end of the corridor?

A. I didn't see any because I was <sup>the</sup> other side. I was near the restaurant corridor.

Q. Did you see if people were sitting down in the corridor?

A. No. But there was a photograph to this effect.



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Q. I mean at the time you were standing there?

A. No.

Q. Is this clear, that you got to Wivenhoe House about the same time as the first policemen?

A. Yes.

My adviser said that he was sitting in the foyer of Wivenhoe House when the police arrived and said that there seemed to be among them some confusion as to why they were there and whether they were authorised to be there. They got there and there was nothing in their mind to act upon.

Q. Did you overhear any of their conversation?

A. This was the gist of the conversation. He didn't hear actually what they were saying.

Q. It is a very difficult estimate to make, but from the time that you first saw the police car in square 5, you saw it coming in?

A. Yes.

Q. From the time you saw it coming in to the time you arrived at Wivenhoe House would be what, about five minutes?

A. Yes, or possibly a bit less. A little under five minutes.
